



Improving livestock farming for the benefit of communities

In March 2026, 90 smallholder livestock farmers graduated after completing a Livestock Farmer Skills Livestock Development programme at the University of Pretoria's Faculty of Veterinary Science.

The initiative saw participants complete three modules covering early disease identification, treatment and prevention, production and seasonal planning, and livestock marketing and sales. The livestock farmers were selected from areas around Sibanye-Stillwater's operations, including 30 from the Lepelle-Nkumpi Local Municipality, 30 from the Rustenburg Local

Municipality and 30 from the Madibeng Local Municipality.

By completing the programme, the farmers have gained high-level knowledge and skills to boost livestock productivity, improve animal health and increase the long-term profitability of their farms.

During the graduation ceremony, the Land Bank provided information on various finance options available to help farmers purchase land and improve production. Sibanye-Stillwater believes that the agricultural sector is important in empowering communities,

providing long-term employment and promoting the growth of sustainable alternative economies.

Twenty traditional leaders from Limpopo and the North West province recently graduated after completing a Finance for Non-Financial Managers programme organised by Sibanye-Stillwater in partnership with the University of the Witwatersrand's Business School.

As part of the programme, these leaders received training in corporate governance, including aspects of financial management and financial statement interpretation. The ceremony

also saw the participation of the Land Bank, which encouraged graduates to use available government services to fully use their land.

Speaking at the event, Thabisile Phumo, Executive Vice President: Stakeholder Relations at Sibanye-Stillwater, praised the commitment of the graduates, and encouraged the traditional leaders to use what they have learned to help their communities develop their economies and their entrepreneurial ventures.

Improving local livestock farmers

Sibanye-Stillwater supports local livestock farming to promote local economic development and job creation. This has seen us partner with experts, businesses and government to construct and maintain smallholder farmers and improve the quality and quantity of produce. Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) poses a threat to the sector, and Sibanye-Stillwater has actively been involved in efforts to promote animal vaccinations and ensure the adoption of best practices by local farmers.

As part of this, officials, led by Sibanye-Stillwater Executive Vice President, Stakeholder Relations, Thabisile Phumo, recently met with the North West Province's MEC for Agriculture and Rural Development, Madoda Sambatha to explore opportunities for collaboration. The meeting focused on helping communities vaccinate their livestock and keep animals healthy.

The donation forms part of our ongoing efforts to improve learner performance and build educational capacity at schools in host communities. Tshukudu High School previously received

tablets and smartboards donated by Sibanye-Stillwater and is part of our ongoing maths and physical science support programme which is implemented at 34 schools around our operations.

Beyond these initiatives, Sibanye-Stillwater continues to invest in quality education within communities through the construction of classrooms, refurbishment of laboratories, learner support programmes, university bursaries and graduate internship opportunities amongst others.

Ensuring access to further education

Go netefatsa gore baagi ba fithelela thuto e e oketsegileng

As part of our effort to improve community access to quality education and opportunities, Sibanye-Stillwater has provided 1,669 bursaries across our South African operations since 2016. Our Top Achievers Programme, run between 2019 and 2025 formed part of this, providing bursaries to top performing matriculants. It supported 72 learners, 40 across our PGM operations of which 22 were female.

Currently 26 of these learners are in the fields of accounting and finance (eight), mechanical engineering (nine), actuarial science (two) and even psychology (two) and social work (one). Nine learners covered by the programme have since graduated, with seven of these being absorbed into our internship programme. These included two who are completing accounting degrees, two chemical engineering and one each in the fields of mining engineering, metallurgy and metals, and geology. The internship programme ensures that

we empower the youth and also remain a modern mining company which is able to retain talent and incorporate new technologies and understandings to improve safety and efficiency.

Improving maths and science education

Go tokafatsa thuto ya dipalo le saense

Since 2021, Sibanye-Stillwater has implemented a maths and physical science programme at 34 secondary schools in host communities. The programme includes remedial afterschool classes for grades 10 to 12, Saturday revision classes for Grade 12s, quarterly training for educators and is aligned to the national curriculum. It supports the Department of Basic Education to achieve a higher pass rate in maths and physical science and encourages learners to choose maths and physical science to improve their future career opportunities.

In 2025, schools benefiting from this programme outperformed the North West province results by 3.6 percentage points in maths and 4.6 percentage points in physical science. The best performing schools were Machadam Combined School in Mooirivier, which received a 100% pass rate for maths and physical science in 2025, and Thaba Morula Secondary School in Segwaelane, which achieved an 85.7% pass rate in mathematics and 96.3% in physical science. Learners in these schools received

16 distinctions for mathematics and 8 for physical science in 2025.

Sibanye-Stillwater supported teaching and training programmes in combination with other complementary efforts to construct schools, renovate maths and science labs and build school playgrounds and sports facilities, to enhance access to quality education.

Improving community safety

Go tokafatsa pabalesego ya baagi

Since the start of the year, the Bojanala Wellness and Safety Centre (BWSC), which was established in partnership with local communities and supported by Sibanye-Stillwater, has run programmes to help keep communities safe. The centre conducted six fire safety awareness campaigns across schools and early learning centres, including at Rethusitswe Pre-School, Jehovah's Angels Pre-school, Nkukime Primary School, Bapo Primary School, Good Hope Early Learning Centre and Maruatona Primary School.

These campaigns reached 470 learners, educating them on the dangers of fires and involving them in efforts to improve fire detection and safety in the community. These engagements also identified critical safety gaps, including lack of fire safety equipment, unsafe infrastructure, limited emergency preparedness, and the need for further interventions such as fire drills and first aid training.

In addition, the Bojanala Wellness and Safety Centre has continued to strengthen relationships with community policing forums and the South African Police Service in local communities to improve community safety and coordination.

BWSC has, since its establishment in 2024, been supporting the communities in the 16 wards of the Bojanala District Municipality to reduce crime, combat gender-based violence (GBV), and access safety and emergency training. The initiative is community centred and seeks to also insure that interventions on community safety and wellbeing are integrated with tackling other critical community challenges.

Lonplats Marikana Community Development Trust uplifts communities

The Lonplats Marikana Community Development Trust was established in 2014 as part of a community ownership and empowerment structure to the deep socio-economic needs of the communities surrounding the

Marikana operations. Funded by dividends received from its 0.9% shareholding in the Marikana operations, it supports projects tackling hunger, elevating education, unlocking youth potential, and strengthening

social cohesion.

Since 2019 the trust has spent over R53 million in support of the community. It provided bursaries to 166 individuals, dignity packs to 4,500, food parcels to 22,490, mobile clinics to 11 wards, and driving school training to 80 community members.

Transforming communities through development

Established in 2016 and officially launched in 2023, the **Sibanye Rustenburg Mine Community Development Trust (SRMCDT)** seeks to drive transformation in the Rustenburg and Madibeng local municipalities. The Trust ensures that mining brings real change to local communities and gives people the tools they need to build a better future.

Initiatives and impacts

Between 2024 and 2025, the Trust invested over R29.8 million for community projects alone.

Previous projects include:

- Investments of R712,208 to improve early detection and survival rates of childhood cancer and train over 1,100 in early detection of cancer in partnership with the Childhood Cancer Foundation
- Donated five response vehicles and ambulances to the North West Department of Health valued at R5 million
- R1.5 million invested to train and employ 25 youth in smart farming, food security projects, and business development skills in partnership with Youth Health Africa (YHA)
- Career development programme implemented reaching over 770 learners
- R9.97 million invested in youth work experience scheme and R2.5 million invested in agriculture living laboratory
- 8,490 people reached through an HIV prevention and skills development programme
- 27 GBVF container pods to be delivered in Rustenburg churches - 18 currently delivered valued at R2.1 million
- 43 farmers supported across emerging and commercial farms and 48 families provided with psychosocial support through the Building Disability

- Inclusion programme
- R5 million invested in the construction of multipurpose sports and ablution facilities
- Investments of over R3.5 million to upgrade school sanitation and water access in partnership with Gift of the Givers and a further R3.9 million for the eradication of pit toilets

By strategically investing in these critical areas, and integrating sustainability into all its initiatives, the Trust is building a foundation for self-sufficient communities that can thrive beyond mining.



Building a thriving Bapo community

The **Bapo Ba Mogale Local Economic Development Trust** was established to drive economic participation and community development of the Bapo Ba Mogale community, which resides in the North West province. The Trust was established in 1998 by Lonmin, which was acquired by Sibanye-Stillwater in 2019. It receives funding from a 0.9% stake in the Sibanye-Stillwater EPL and WPL operations. It focuses on education, enterprise development, infrastructure, and social welfare amongst others.

Initiatives and impacts:

The Trust has supported over R130 million in community

investments, in partnership with businesses, especially Sibanye-Stillwater.

As part of this, the Trust:

- provides annual food vouchers for the elderly and disabled
- invested over R500,000 in funding to 30 small businesses to foster entrepreneurship and job creation - 15 are now Sibanye-Stillwater vendors as a result of the success of the initiative
- provided training to teachers and financial support to nine early childhood centres in the North West in partnership with Sibanye-Stillwater
- donated wheelchairs and

assistive devices

- awarded bursaries to over 25 learners, including seven matric top achievers
- partnered with Sibanye-Stillwater to launch the Ditlou Bee Farming project in Bapong, North West, which has produced over 250kg of honey to date. Visit www.beeafrican.africa to view their products and make your purchase
- together with Sibanye-Stillwater, Agriculture Research Centre (ARC) and the Department of Agriculture and Rural Development, implemented a livestock programme, which assists participating local farmers

with stock management and training. Cattle camps, crush pans, and scales for farmers were also constructed

- is currently involved in the construction of six grade R classes budgeted at R40 million

The work of the Trust ensures that the financial gains from mining activity translate into tangible socio-economic improvements for the community.
