Go tokafatsa temothuo ya diphologolo

Sibanye-Stillwater, in partnership with the Department of Mineral and Petroleum Resources, the North West Department of Agriculture and Rural Development and the Bapo Ba Mogale Traditional Authority, recently handed over infrastructure and 14 stud bulls to smallholder farmers at Bapong, Segwaelane and Wonderkop in the North West province.

Over 98 local communal livestock owners benefited from this programme, which aims to improve subsistence farming and food security in host communities. The bulls will also improve the genetic quality of the herd and have been vaccinated against Food and Mouth Disease. The programme, which was delivered in partnership with the Agricultural Research Council, forms part of Sibanye-Stillwater's social and labour plan.

As part of this programme, the company also built cattle kraals and crush pens and financed infrastructural improvements. Boreholes were also drilled and storage tanks and drinking

troughs installed to allow for water access.

The smallholder livestock farmers also graduated from a Livestock Farmer Skills Livestock Development programme at the University of Pretoria's Faculty of Veterinary Science.

Speaking at the handover, Mineral and Petroleum Resources Minister Gwede Mantashe thanked Sibanye-Stillwater for implementing such an innovative and futuristic initiative, which benefits mining communities. "When we (told) mining companies to invest in impactful projects, this is what we meant," he said.

At Sibanye-Stillwater, our approach to shared value is rooted in the belief that mining must deliver tangible, lasting benefits not just for shareholders, but for employees, families and surrounding communities.

Improving healthcare access for communities

Sibanye-Stillwater and the Sibanye Rustenburg Mine Community Development Trust (SRMCDT) recently partnered with the Mobile Health Clinics Foundation (MHCF) to launch a fully equipped mobile healthcare facility, which will provide essential healthcare services to Rustenburg communities.

The mobile facility is fully equipped and consists of dedicated rooms for primary healthcare, dental care and optometry. It will also provide referrals and follow-up support where needed, and hold community outreach programmes to promote healthcare awareness and preventative healthcare education.

Beneficiary communities from the Rustenburg Local Municipality will now have access to multiple quality healthcare services in one visit.

The partnership is focused on health promotion, early intervention, and ensuring that vulnerable groups receive appropriate referrals and follow-up care. The mobile clinic will bring healthcare services directly into communities, enabling early identification and management of health concerns, and improving access to preventative healthcare services for all.

As part of this, we have built and renovated clinics, organised healthcare screening and preventative testing, and run

programmes to promote health awareness and wellbeing.

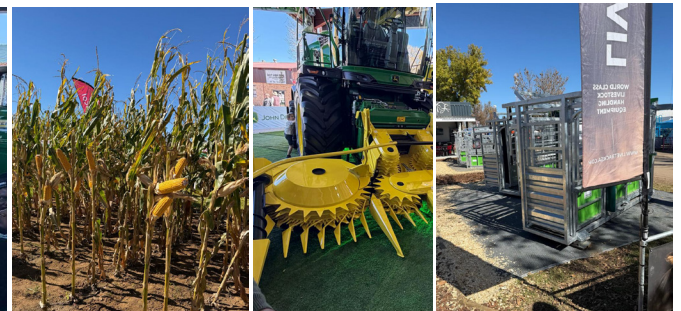

Local honey is lekker

Sibanye-Stillwater, in partnership with the Department of Mineral and Petroleum Resources, the North West Department of Agriculture and Rural Development and the Bapo Ba Mogale Traditional Authority, has established a honey production unit, which included training local youth in beekeeping.

The Ditlou beekeeping project in Bapong is led by two local women entrepreneurs. Sibanye-Stillwater also helped the business to attend the annual South African Bee Industry Organisation's (SABIO) BeeCon conference at Sun City between 30 June and 1 July 2026, which brought together different stakeholders from the industry to promote collaboration and unpack the industry's future challenges and opportunities. The conference

also hosted the national honey, meads and bee products competition, which recognises innovation and excellence in the local bee industry.

Sibanye-Stillwater previously trained and donated 500 beehives and personal protective equipment to the entrepreneurs. They also attended an incubator programme implemented in partnership with Enterprise University of Pretoria.

Since its inception in 2023, the project has produced over 255kg of honey. Sibanye-Stillwater has purchased some of the honey and has developed an e-commerce platform to link these beekeepers with markets. Visit www.beeafrican.africa for more information.

Sibanye-Stillwater recently celebrated the graduation of 60 local small, medium and micro enterprise (SMME) owners from host communities who successfully completed a two-week carpentry training programme in partnership with Phakamani Impact Capital.

The programme was designed to strengthen business capabilities and provided hands-on carpentry training, practical business skills and exposure to industry networks, supporting long-term business growth and sustainability.

At the graduation event, participants also engaged with organisations including Allan Gray Makers, Innovus, the South African Women in Construction (SAWIC), Built Environment (BE) and the National Home Builders Registration Council (NHBC). These organisations shared information on the opportunities, industry support services, and development programmes available to emerging entrepreneurs.

One of the graduates, Sindisiwe Bhembe, from Westonaria, reiterated that the programme has positively impacted her future aspirations. "We are grateful for the skills we have gained because they will work in our favour. I will now be able to return home and employ people from my community, which will help reduce crime and break the cycle of poverty for those individuals."

Youth take charge of community safety

Sibanye-Stillwater has set up two Bojanala Safety Wellness Centres in Marikana and Rustenburg aimed at promoting community safety and wellness.

Managed by William Senyane, a local community leader from Ward 32 Marikana West, 224 community safety coordinators (CSCs) have been trained in Marikana and 40 were recruited from Rustenburg. The training covers water safety, firefighting,

first-aid and community asset base research.

The Marikana centre has also conducted safety awareness campaigns in communities, especially in schools. In addition, 952 safety kits have been donated to Marikana communities, while a further 100 kits will be donated to Rustenburg communities in the coming months.

The centre has also worked with community policing forums and the South African Police Service (SAPS) in managing community safety.

Gabedi showcases youth entrepreneurship

At just 25, Gabedi Lesejane is the co-founder and co-director of Gabs and Maps Multi-Purpose, a Rustenburg-based business originally rooted in engineering. Today, however, its fastest-growing division is cleaning. From office parks to malls, Gabs and Maps now delivers full-service hygiene solutions with a strong focus on compliance, professionalism and value for money.

Gabedi co-founded the business with his mother in 2018 while studying mechanical engineering. After graduating and completing the Sibanye-Stillwater Youth in Mining Enterprise and Supplier Development (ESD) programme, he realised just how far they could take the business. With the right tools, training and support, they expanded their offerings, grew their client base and built a team of more than 20 permanent staff.

The company now operates across two Rustenburg sites

and is expanding its footprint in Gauteng, with vendor registrations underway for major property and retail players like Growthpoint and Sun International.

Gabedi says the decision to focus on cleaning came from recognising the consistent demand and the chance to professionalise a service that is often overlooked. "Cleaning is one of those industries people do not always take seriously, but it is essential. We want to change the narrative. We want to make cleaning professional and even exciting. Our team has more than 50 years of combined experience and we invest in annual upskilling to ensure we stay ahead."

The shift in focus does not mean engineering has been abandoned. The company is still tendering for several contracts in the mining sector; however, the cleaning division is growing rapidly and has opened doors to new markets. From laundry

services to deep cleaning, the goal is to become a holistic cleaning service provider for large organisations.

Gabedi credits much of his business growth to the Sibanye-Stillwater ESD programme, delivered by Phakamani Impact Capital. "The training helped me understand our value proposition better. It helped us see where we could offer more value in the value chain. I learned how to communicate what we do more clearly, how to present to large clients and how to position our services in line with industry standards," he says.

Beyond the operations, Gabedi's personal growth has been equally significant. "I used to struggle with public speaking. I used to stutter; now I have the confidence to stand up and pitch our services with clarity and pride. The coaching helped me open my mind and realise what we could really achieve. It gave me a vision."

In the next five years, he wants to see Gabs and Maps operating nationally with at least 100 employees, regional operations managers, and a fleet of vehicles to support growth. He also wants to secure ISO certification and continue investing in systems that support quality, safety and compliance.

"Our aim is to offer a world-class service, every time. No shortcuts, no paperwork missing. Just professionalism, value and results," says Gabedi.

According to the RSR there are 7,665 level crossings in South Africa, of which 437 are classified as high-risk. The Dr. Moroka level crossing has been identified as one of these high-risk level crossings in the North West, even though incidents and accidents have decreased in recent years.
